FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT'S DESK

This time of year my focus is to get back into routine work with the focus on upholding the Schools' Mission Statement – "Hartsburg-Emden Community Unit School District provides an empowering and collaborative environment allowing students to reach their full potential." Excellence requires careful planning and analysis of the district as a whole, which includes more than just the fiscal oversight, which I can admit is a good portion of my dealings. However, school culture and climate is a critical issue schools face. Students are learning more than the 3 R's (Reading, Riting, and Rithmetic, as the old saying goes). An important R that students really need to learn about is Relationships. There isn't a course in relationships. Children need to learn how to treat each other properly; it is critical. October has been established as Bullying Prevention Month. Each year, our staff takes training on identifying, addressing, and reporting bullying. The State has mandated this training and has provided information about bullying. Bullying is an issue that schools have been taking very seriously for many years. Hartsburg-Emden will continue to combat all issues involving bullying. We will continue to address all inappropriate behavior when it is brought forward.

- All students have the right to attend a school where individual differences are respected and to learn in a safe, secure and supportive environment that is free of bullying.
- Three key criteria that distinguish what bullying is:
 - $\circ~$ It is intentionally hurtful and/or aggressive behavior
 - It is a pattern of behavior that is repetitive
 - It may happen regularly and over some period of time
 - It involves a perceived imbalance of power or strength
 - The person being bullied feels they have less power or strength

Two Types of Bullying

<u>Direct Bullying</u> may be physical [examples include: hitting, kicking, shoving, spitting, choking] and/or verbal [examples include: name calling, threatening, taunting, malicious teasing)

<u>Indirect Bullying</u> is more subtle and less easy to detect [examples include: intentional social isolation, exclusion, lies, false rumors, and/or reputation slandering]

There is an increasing number of individuals who are using technology to tease, intimidate, threaten, and/or otherwise cause harm to a student, group of students, and/or school personnel [examples include: email messages, instant messages, text messages, digital pictures or images, and Facebook postings].

- Such acts constitute bullying regardless of whether they are committed on or off school district property.
 - Bullying that happens off school grounds usually has ramifications in some form at school
- Bullying interferes directly with a student's ability to learn. Students who are bullied may find it difficult to concentrate and sometimes experience a decline in grades and a diminished sense of confidence/self-esteem.
- The responsibility preventing bullying rests on the <u>entire school community</u> including parents, administrators, teachers, staff, and students.

- Everyone is responsible for helping prevent bullying
 - The biggest thing everyone can do is to report it when they observe it happening
- Parents play a crucial role in helping with bullying prevention
 - If your child is being bullied, or if you are aware of others who are the targets of such behavior, please report this information immediately to your child's teacher or an administrator
 - We appreciate your support in addressing this important issue
- The district's goals with bullying are:
 - Prevent all bullying and to take action to investigate, respond to, remediate, and when appropriate, discipline acts of bullying
 - Address issues as soon as possible and correct any misbehavior as soon as possible
 - Pursue a safe environment where all students respect each other
 - Continually encourage our students to treat each other with dignity and respect
 - Have our students follow the golden rule: treat others as you wish to be treated
 - Encourage our students to not tolerate and report all bullying

On a final note: I love the fall season. The changing of the color of the trees and cooler days is such a great opportunity to be outside to enjoy some of nature's wonders. I hope you all find the time to enjoy it; it seems like such a short season.

- The FAFSA opens for applications on October 1st, 2017. All seniors should submit their applications as soon as possible in order for the best opportunity for federal assistance. Many schools are asking students to have their FAFSA applications submitted by a priority deadline of November 15th. Many university scholarships may also fall under this date.
- Hartsburg-Emden High School will be • hosting a FAFSA Completion Workshop on Thursday, October 19th, 2017. All seniors and their parents are strongly encouraged to attend. A representative from the Illinois Student Assistance Commission will be providing a brief presentation about the FAFSA and will be available to provide hands-on assistance in completing the FAFSA application on-site.
