FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT'S DESK

It continues to be a great time to be a Hartem Stag!! Our school has received some positive recognition and word is traveling. For the 1st time since 2010, enrollment is up. I really believe that Hartsburg-Emden C.U.S.D. #21 is on the right trend. Continual growth and a positive work/learning environment continue to be the focus of the staff. We continue to make advances with school pride and academic confidence in our students. With that said, we often want our students to seek challenges and persist through difficulty. But so often, we see students try to take the easy way out, who give up at the first signs of difficulty, or who get frustrated at constructive feedback. However, struggles for students can be beneficial. All students, especially high-performing students, can fall prey to anxiety about failure. My point is that many students feel very vulnerable in school. For many children, school is above all a place where they are tested and judged, often publicly, and feelings of inadequacy can happen. We frequently place a high expectation on children and are intolerant of failure. We don't intend to make children to feel vulnerable and we don't want them to avoid taking risks that would allow them to grow, but that is often what happens.

Students associate mistakes with failure. Most students dread the word mistake, especially a public one. Most adults fear making public mistakes as well. However, we often hear people say that they've learned more from their mistakes than from their successes. A student recently told me, when I asked him why he didn't even attempt a difficult math problem, that he didn't want to make a mistake. Making a mistake makes you feel stupid (a failure), and then you get embarrassed. I think many of us can relate to this. In this case, it wasn't that the student couldn't attempt the problem, but he didn't want to take the risk of failure or "feeling stupid", so, he chose to avoid the challenge. The good news is that it's within our power to change this by creating a risk-tolerant learning environment. We need to help students understand the value mistakes play during the learning process. Mistakes are a terrific opportunity to learn. Learning requires stretching students beyond their comfort zone. Mistakes happen and we must learn from them.

Having a growth mindset helps tremendously. When a mistake happens, we need to praise the risk-taking, not criticize the outcome. Focus student's attention on continual growth, rather than fixed knowledge base. Keep their attention on effort and strategy. Make challenge-seeking and knowledge-seeking a priority, rather than a fixed outcome or grade. Encourage students to always look for the next challenge. This inspires students to take on more responsibility for their own learning. It is also important to separate a mistake from a failure. Making a mistake while attempting something new and learning from it, is something completely different than making a wrong choice. In both cases, we may say the student made a mistake. But in the 1st case, the mistake shows effort and a willingness to learn. We need to make a clear distinction between the two situations.

As I said earlier, this is a great time to be a Hartem Stag!! We have a lot of great things happening in our schools. I believe the future of our schools remains bright. We continue to work hard to keep it that way. Literacy still is the number one indicator for college success, which is why it will remain our top priority. However, Hartsburg-Emden will always continue to move forward with everything we do. We are staying committed to a continual growth mindset and are looking to improve each and every school year. Along with a positive school culture filled with school pride, Hartem students are being put on the right path for lifelong success. As our mission statement says, "allowing students to reach their full potential." We thank you for your support and we are hoping for an early Spring.

- There is enough pressure on kids. Added pressure from reacting to the mistakes they make, being critical and negative, and heightened emotions create unneeded stress and take away from the fun of the game.

We have made a commitment to IESA to promote good sportsmanship by student-athletes, coaches, and spectators at all Hartem athletic events. Profanity, degrading remarks, and intimidating actions directed at officials, the coach, or any student-athletes (including your own) will not be tolerated and are grounds for removal from the event site.

Dual-Credit Courses

Are you interested in taking college classes while still in high school? Dual credit is an opportunity for students in grades 11-12 to take classes in high school and one or more college level classes on an online university. Dual credit courses are a great opportunity to receive extra high school credit AND earn college credit towards Gen. Eds. The courses that will be offered next year are: **HIST 102** (Western Civilization Since 1500) and **BUSN 110** (Introduction to Business).

Qualifications:

If you are interested in taking a Dual Credit course next year (AY 17-18), you MUST complete a Heartland application and ACCUPLACER Assessment (or submit a qualifying score) by March 30th in order to be eligible to enroll in the course. Students can submit qualifying ACT and/or SAT scores in place of the ACCUPLACER. Contact Mrs. Feltes for more details.
