Hartsburg-Emden C.U.S.D. #21 is continuing on the right trend. Continual growth and a positive work/learning environment continue to be the focus of the staff. Developing and maintaining a Culture of Learning is happening. It seems we continue to grow and develop as a staff each year. We will always have areas for improvement, but this staff seems to be one of the most cohesive groups we have had for the past 13 years. We continue to make advances with school pride and academic confidence in our students. Two Illinois State Scholars added to our halls with Noah Doolin and Jace Whitted. In general terms, they are performing in the top 15% of all students in Illinois. There are a few different data points in the calculation . . . but the SAT score weighs heavily. Congratulations to both these students. It is nice to see our students performing at high levels. Developing a school climate and culture where our students are allowed to flourish has been, and continues to be, our goal.

We often ask our students to seek challenges and persist through difficulty, to push themselves. That is exactly how one gets to performing at a high level. However, so often, we are confronted with obstacles. It is not always easy for students to put themselves at risk for failure. Students often take the easy way out and give up at the first signs of difficulty because they do not wish to be branded as failures. All students, especially high-performing students, can fall prey to anxiety about failure. My point is that many students feel very vulnerable in school. To instill in students that failure needs to be thought of as discovery. Many of us remember the story of Thomas Edison and the invention of the light bulb. He could not keep the filament from burning out too quickly. He tested more than 3,000 filaments for electrical light between 1878 and 1880. His persistence led him to discovery of placing the filaments in a vacuum made of glass (bulb) to prevent air from getting to it and burning it out. Only after all his attempts that failed, he realized he needed to take a different approach to the problem that led to success.

For many children, school is above all a place where they are tested and judged, often publicly, and feelings of inadequacy can happen. We frequently place a high expectation on children and too many people are intolerant of failure. We do not intend to make children to feel vulnerable and we do not want them to avoid taking risks that would allow them to discover what works. That discovery method is often what deepens their knowledge. The overall goal is to create a Culture of Learning, where mistakes are accepted and students are rewarded for their individual growth. Each year, we seem to move closer and closer to this goal. Changing mindsets, creating and maintaining a culture is a constant battle.

Again, we have many great things happening at Hartem and we are constantly looking for ways to improve. I believe the future of our students remains bright. We must continue to work hard to keep it that way. We are constantly looking for ways to add curriculum and provide opportunity for our students. We have added Literary Films, Creative Writing, Basic Physic, Weather, Forensic, and added JH Chess Team in addition to the HS Chess Team we added 5 years ago. We have expanded the dual credit acceptance of the Heartland Community College courses we allow, so students can earn additional college credit. We have been open to allowing all our students opportunities to explore their educational interests in a safe and secure environment. It is a great time to be a student at Hartsburg-Emden C.U.S.D. #21.

Literacy remains number one indicator for life success, which is why it will remain our top priority. All our teachers keep pushing our Authentic Literacy Program. I hope all our parents continue to encouraging their children to read for 15-30 minutes every night, at all grade levels. Although reading is very critical, Hartsburg-Emden will always continue to move forward with everything we do. Again, this may be the most cohesive, positive, and caring staff we've seen in the past 13 years. We need to keep moving in that direction to keep improving our culture for learning and success. As our mission statement says, "allowing students to reach their full potential." The benefits of our small rural schools are many and I see those benefits almost every day in our school. GO STAGS!!

Elizabeth Hilgert, Student Coordinator/Guidance Counselor 24-25 DUAL CREDIT COURSES

It's time to start thinking about courses for the 24-25 school year. Are you interested in taking college classes while still in high school? Dual credit is an opportunity for students in grades 11-12 to receive extra high school credit AND earn college credit towards Gen. Eds. HEHS will be offering the following dual credit courses next year: LIT 111: Introduction to Literature, HUMA 101:

Introduction to Humanities and BUSN 110: Introduction to Business.

Qualifications:

If you are interested in taking a Dual Credit course next year (AY 24-25), you <u>MUST</u> complete a Heartland application by <u>February 29, 2024</u>, and ACCUPLACER Assessment (or submit a qualifying score) by <u>March 29, 2024</u> in order to be eligible to enroll in the course. Students can submit qualifying ACT or PSAT/SAT scores in place of the ACCUPLACER. [Please note: There is a \$200 registration fee for each dual credit class. See Mrs. Hilgert for details.

ILLINOIS YOUTH SURVEY

This month, students in 8th, 10th, and 12th grade at HEHS will be asked to participate in the Illinois Youth Survey (IYS). The purpose of the IYS is to better understand youth attitudes and behaviors that can impact student problems and academic success. It will ask about topics including nutrition, physical activity, bullying, tobacco, alcohol, and other drug use. Participation is voluntary and privacy will be strictly protected. The Illinois Youth Survey will provide our school with a local report of the combined student results which will help to determine which programs may be needed to keep students safe and healthy. Obtaining full participation is very important in the ability of our school to continue to improve the programs and strategies to prevent youth problems behaviors and enhance youth development. UPCOMING TESTING

The PSAT and SAT will be given digitally this spring. The SAT will consist of the same general format and content. The test format is all online and will last approximately 2 hours. Math will be 70 minutes long and 44 questions, divided equally between two modules and you can use a calculator on the entire section. In the combined Reading and Writing (R&W) Section there will be two modules, each taking 32 minutes and comprising 27 questions.

During the test, students will have access to a set of tools:

- On math questions, they will find a reference sheet and a calculator. They are allowed to bring their own calculator.
- On reading and writing questions, use the annotation tool to highlight text or leave yourself a note.
- On multiple-choice questions, if you think an answer option is wrong, you can cross it out.
- You can mark for review any questions you want to come back to later.

Students will have one 10-minute break during the test between test sections. They are able to take an unscheduled break if needed, but will lose testing time.
