FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT'S DESK

Illinois has its second death due to vaping. I believe most schools and parents wanted to believe that with an all-time low of students using actual tobacco products, students wouldn't turn to e-cigarettes. However, many schools are seeing an increase in the use of these devices and they've become very popular among teens. According to AP News, the youngest person hospitalized due to vaping was 13 and the oldest 67. The median age of the almost 600 people in the USA hospitalized for vaping is 22 years old, which means that over half the individuals hospitalized were 22 years old or less. As students have available to them a new generation of easily concealed devices that have a sleek high-tech design, some even looking like an ink pen, laser pointer, or flash drive. E-cigarettes have become a popular trend among teenagers; kids truly believe they are safe and cool. Many students believe there is absolutely nothing wrong with using an e-cig. These devices often taste like fruits or mints and they produce a smell of plume. It is possible to go tasteless and have no smell which makes it conceivable for some students to even vape in school virtually unnoticeable. It is possible to pin these devices on to the inside of a shirt collar and take a hit every now and then, and nobody would really know the difference. E-cigs were widely advertised as safer than traditional cigarettes and many bought into the concept they were going to be completely safe. However, they still are too new for researchers to know the long-term health effects of all these flavored liquids (mostly referred to as e-liquid, e-juice, or juice), which is making our children guinea pigs for the side effects of vaping.

E-cigs do not necessarily have to contain nicotine, but many e-liquids/juices do. They can even have more nicotine than a regular tobacco cigarette. E-cigs also can have THC, the psychoactive ingredient in marijuana that produces a high. Again, can be flavorless and no odor. **I fear that the devices are creating a young generation of nicotine/marijuana addicts who believe it is safe.** I encourage all our parents, grandparents, and guardians to have a serious discussion with their children about the potential harms of using all vaping products. Let them know, like with tobacco cigarettes, many years went by without knowing the long-term side

effects of these products. We may not know the long term side effects for vaping for years to come. Students with asthma are very much at risk for having difficulties. Nicotine and THC are addictive drugs and have several side effects that include rapid heartbeat, increased blood pressure, shortness of breath, and reduced judgment.

Every year I typically discuss good sportsmanship and the importance it has in developing our students. Over 30 years ago, I was a senior in High School, getting ready to graduate. My goal was simple, go to ISU (Illinois State University) to study Mathematics in order to get a job teaching mathematics and coach basketball. This is my 24th year in education. So, you can see my plan didn't quite turn out the way I anticipated. I dropped out of ISU (after my 1st semester Junior year) to join the Marine Corps after my brother was shipped to Saudi Arabia. While I was in boot camp, the "100 Hour Ground War" took place and the Iraq forces were pushed out of Kuwait. Anyway, it ended up taking me 8 years (after I graduated) to meet that goal of becoming a Mathematics Teacher, then becoming a Basketball Coach. My basketball coaching career consists of being a Head Coach for Freshman Basketball (class 4A school - over 2000 students in grades 9-12) while being an Assistant Varsity Coach (Bradley-Bourbonnais Community High School). I also coached basketball at the 5th&6th grade level at Donovan Junior High (class 1A - a little bigger than Hartem). In addition, I coached for several years at the youth league levels for my oldest son. Basketball was the only sport I ever coached. It also happened to be my favorite sport to watch, play, study, learn, and teach. Basketball consumed a majority of my time from October to March. My coaching career quickly came to an end for me after I entered administration. However, my love for all sports (not just basketball) has always been strong. I have learned that it is extremely easy to get caught up in a sport. It is also easy to express dissatisfaction in something (a bad play or a bad call). Most people like to win and hate to lose. It is not uncommon to be caught in a position where you do not represent yourself or your school in a very positive manner. However, whether we are a parent, player, coach, staff member, or spectator, it is critical that we model good sportsmanship. Our kids learn from our actions more so than what we say.

So, what we do does leave an impression on them. Please keep this in mind when attending sporting events. I ask that everyone please demonstrate good sportsmanship and cheer on our kids in a positive way while attending our sporting events. I also would hope that all of you find an opportunity to come out and watch our students compete. There is something special about watching our students (at each of the levels) compete. Please, check out our website (or come in and get a pocket calendar) and come enjoy a game with us. Go Stags!!

To end my article, I'd like wish everyone a wonderful Thanksgiving. I hope you are able to spend some time with your families, make some good memories, and appreciate the blessings you have.

October is always a busy month in the world of counseling. October is not only National Bullying Prevention Month, it also includes Red Ribbon Week, PSAT NMSQT testing, and the FAFSA opens. One of my goals this year is to try to incorporate more social-emotional curriculum across all grade levels to help promote healthy relationships and coping skills. To achieve this goal, I have been busy presenting Second Step™

(www.secondstep.org) lessons in all of the grade school classrooms. These lessons begin by teaching students to be respectful learners and will soon explore feelings and coping skills. At the junior high/high school level, I am beginning to implement the Choose Love Movement lessons. The Choose Love Enrichment Program™ is a next generation Social and Emotional Learning program that teaches educators and their students how to choose love in any circumstance and helps them become connected, resilient, and empowered individuals. These skills, tools and attitudes have been proven through decades of scientific research to be the best way to ensure a healthy, meaningful and purpose-filled life. You can find out more about this program at www.jesselewischooselove.org/. I am excited about these lessons and hope that they will further build a positive school climate for our students.

I also got to attend CareerSpark with the 8th grade class on October 9th. Students were able to explore possible future careers through hands-on activities. This is a great experience for our students. I heard a lot of good things from them and am excited to bring next year's class in 2020.

A handful of sophomore and junior students participated in the PSAT on October 16th. These students will receive personalized test prep resources for the SAT when they receive their scores this winter. Remember, all 11th grade students will be taking the SAT in April. Check out all of the great, free test prep resources through College Board (collegeboard.org) and Khan Academy (satpractice.org).
