FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT'S DESK

We have almost completed the first quarter of the school year already! The official end to the first quarter of school will be Friday, October 19th. I appreciate all the support given to our school district and teachers by the parents and community. Wednesday, October 3rd and Thursday, 4th will be parent-teacher conferences. I hope parents are able to attend to have some great conversations with teachers about their child's academic progress. If you are unable to attend the conferences, please contact your child's teacher to set up a meeting to discuss how your child is doing in school. We strive to develop positive home-school relationships with our families. If you have a concern or question, please call or email your child's teachers and/or the District Office so we can answer your questions or concerns.

Last year, our students took another State assessment (this was the 1st year they didn't change the PARCC - Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers). The Assessment is aligned to the Illinois Standards (a.k.a. the Common Core Standards), which has now been implemented and tested by the Pearson Company for the last 5 years. This year a new company will be taking over the State assessment, Data Recognition Corporation (DRC). Actually, they are a company that broke away from the Pearson Company. I'm being told they will still be focusing on the Illinois/Common Core Standards. The test will be called the Illinois Assessment of Readiness (IAR instead of PARCC). However, the test itself will pretty much be the same as the PARCC test on a different online computer based platform this school year. Data Recognition Corporation plans to modify the test to meet Illinois desires/requests after this 1st year. They still plan on establishing cut-off scores in which only 33% of students in grades 3-8 meet the standards and the average student in Illinois will not meet the standards, indicating there will still be a very high cutoff score. The rationale for these cutoff scores is also closer to what most industrialized nations use as a cutoff score and it is also closer to (what research shows) the percentage of Americans that earn a bachelor's college degree, about 30%.

DRC was awarded a six (6) year contract to give the IAR for the State of Illinois assessment.

The good news is that Hartsburg-Emden Elementary School has continued to score higher than the State average by 6% (6% more of our students are meeting or exceeding on the State assessment above the average). Our students also scored above the State average on both the ELA (English Language Arts) and Math. The official scores have been released to schools and school report cards should be released from the State by the end of October. We will review the scores and share your child's test data with you at the conferences. Please remember that State assessment scores are only a piece of the equation when it comes to monitoring individual student progress. We believe it is more important to concentrate on the daily instruction and classroom assessments in addition to the yearly State assessments, keeping in mind the intentionally high cutoff score. Yes, the State assessment is important and is required, but our energy and dedication has been focused on the interactions and learning we have with your children on a daily basis. We have focused on our Authentic Literacy Program for several years now and our test scores have really taken care of themselves. As you receive information about your child's assessment scores. please contact Mr. Leslie, District Principal, and/or classroom teachers if you have any questions or concerns.

In conclusion, I'd like to say that we have many exciting activities going on in our buildings. We continually work on developing positive relationships with our students. We stress to our students the concepts of continual growth and maintaining a culture of learning. I enjoy getting into the classrooms and attending school events in the evening to watch our students grow and develop. I encourage each of you (our community) to take full advantage of what we have to offer. As always, I appreciate the support you give our district, staff, and especially our students. It is the positive and ongoing partnership that makes Hartsburg-Emden a great place to be a Stag! The world could use a little bit more of that.

GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT

Progress Reports were sent home on Sept. 20th. This is a great opportunity to review your child's progress towards semester grades.

If your child needs academic support:

- Discuss the course with your child. What challenges are they facing?
- Are they using their planner? HEHS provided every student a free planner the first day of school.
- Make sure you have Tyler Gradebook access. Check this often to help your child stay up-to-date with his/her course and remind them to turn in any missing assignments.
- Contact the teacher to get more information about the course expectations and outline- some teachers use a website to communicate information
- Students should attend before/after school help sessions with teachers, if possible

College Applications

 Seniors – Make sure you get started on those college applications! With the earlier FAFSA date, many universities are looking at earlier application deadlines. Be sure to check with each school to determine important deadlines.

Speaking of the FAFSA...

- The FAFSA opened for applications on October 1st, 2018. All seniors should submit their applications as soon as possible in order for the best opportunity for federal assistance. Many schools are asking students to have their FAFSA applications submitted by a priority deadline of November 15th. Many university scholarships may also fall under this date.
- Hartsburg-Emden High School will be hosting a FAFSA Completion Workshop on Wednesday, October 10th, 2018. All seniors and their parents are strongly encouraged to attend. The Executive Director of the Logan County Education Coalition will be providing a brief presentation about the FAFSA and will be available to provide hands-on assistance in completing the FAFSA application on-site. This workshop will take place in the HS computer lab from

5:30 – 6:30 pm. Please RSVP with Mrs. Feltes (afeltes@hartem.org) for a list of important items to bring with to the workshop. If you cannot attend this workshop but would still like to attend a completion workshop, visit isac.org and search "Outreach Activities Calendar" for a list of upcoming workshops across Illinois.
